Committee Meeting outcomes.

With the AGM behind us, the Committee is adopting a project-based organisation in terms of roles and responsibilities. Individual members of the Executive and Committee are allocated specific responsibilities for which they are accountable to the Committee and Members of the sub-Branch. The Executive Team provides oversight of the responsibilities allocated to individual members of the Committee. Sub-Committees continue but only where the objectives are best served by collaboration, oversight and co-ordination. The full list of roles and tasks will be uploaded to the website shortly.

The Committee is continuing to move forward with the initial elements of the sub-Branch's Strategic Plan with a focus on improving communications with the wider veteran community in our local area. The Coffee Club mentioned previously is one of these initiatives.

Youth Clubs activities.

Youth Club activities have been severely curtailed due to the pandemic restrictions but some gymnastics staff have been conducting online classes for youth club members in the Kindergym, Recreational and Competitive Levels Program.

Heritage

Snippets from the Past.

April and May are significant months in Australia's military history. As always, we commemorate ANZAC Day on the 25 April albeit this year in a very different manner. We have also just marked the 75th anniversary of VE Day (Victory in Europe). For the many Australian servicemen serving in European theatres, this was a significant event but for Australia as a whole, the war in the Pacific was a much greater focus. For example, three days after VE day, the 6th Division captured Wewak as part of the last major campaign on mainland New Guinea

Between April 1915 and May 1945, many events occurred which have become significant in our military history. Events such as the two Battles of Bullecourt in 1917, the Ludendorff Offensives in 1918, the defensive battles against the Germans in 1941 in Greece, Crete and Tobruk, the dark days of 1942 after the fall of Singapore and successful operations at Wewak and Tarakan in 1945.


We also remember more recent anniversaries in April and May including the Battle of Kapyong in Korea in 1951 and the defence of Fire Support Bases Coral and Balmoral in South Vietnam in 1968.

These and many smaller actions had impacts throughout Australia including our own local area. For example, of the eight memorials in Hornsby Shire, the Hornsby Memorial alone commemorates 16 individuals who died in April or May during the four years of World War 1. 

The Forest Mill Saw was probably a great piece of equipment when cutting soft northern European timbers but wasn't up to the task when faced with NSW Ironbark.
